CATHEDRALS IN EUROPE

Project 4—Do-It-Yourself Stained Glass Window

As well as adding beauty to the cathedrals, stained glass windows provided a very important function in the education of the people in the church. Since most could not read, the windows served as wordless stories from the Bible. To tell the stories the makers of the windows would use symbols. Below is a list of some of the symbols they used. Also, a character would often be shown with a symbol in hand that would identify them from the other people. For example, St. Peter was shown with "the keys" to the Church and John the Baptist with a rough camel's hair coat.


